



REGULATION OF EVICTIONS

No person may be evicted from their place of residence, regardless of whether it is a formal or informal residence or a farm dwelling for the duration of the lockdown.

SA LOCKDOWN REGULATIONS



AMENDMENTS IN RELATION TO THE MOVEMENT OF CHILDREN DURING LOCKDOWN

The movement of children between co-holders of parental responsibilities and rights or a caregiver remains prohibited during the lockdown period except where arrangements are in place for a child to move from one parent to another, in terms of –

(i) a court order; or (ii) where a parental responsibilities and rights agreement or parenting plan, registered with the family advocate, is in existence:

Provided that there is no person who is known or reasonably suspected to have come into contact with any other person known or reasonably suspected to have contracted COVID-19 in the household which the child has to move to. The parent or caregiver transporting the child concerned must have in his or her possession, the court order or the parental responsibilities and rights agreement or parenting plan.



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REGULATION ON MINING OPERATIONS

Mining operations, shall be conducted at a reduced capacity of 50% during the period of lockdown, these mines must comply with the following conditions:



A	A rigorous screening and testing program must be implemented as employees return to work;
B	The mining industry must provide quarantine facilities for employees who have tested positive for the COVID-19;
C	Data collected during the screening and testing programme must be submitted to the relevant authority;
D	Mining companies must make arrangements to transport their employees from their homes to their respective areas of operations;
E	In accordance with these Regulations and other regulations applicable in neighbouring Southern African Development Community countries, workers from these neighbouring countries will be recalled at the end of lockdown in their respective countries.

The monitoring and impact assessment of seismicity through the Council for Geoscience must be intensified with immediate effect.

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AMENDMENT WITH REGARDS TO CATEGORIES OF STORES PERMITTED TO TRADE - **HARDWARE STORES**

Stores selling hardware products and vehicle components may open but must maintain a register of persons buying essential goods and must keep a record of a signed declaration, which corresponds substantially with a new form introduced whereby the buyer of goods attests that the goods are essential goods.



Products to be sold by hardware stores are hardware components and supplies required by any qualified tradespersons solely for the purpose of essential repairs at residential homes and entities engaged in the provision of essential services for any project related to the provision of water, electricity or other essential services.

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CATEGORISATION OF ESSENTIAL SERVICES

- 1 Medical, health (including mental health), laboratory and medical services and the National Institute for Communicable Diseases;
- 2 Disaster Management, Fire Prevention, Fire Fighting and Emergency services;
- 3 (a) The following services necessary to maintain the functioning of a financial system as defined in section 170 of the Financial Sector Regulation Act, only when the operation of a place of business or entity is necessary to continue to perform those services:
 - (i) The banking environment (including the operations of mutual banks, co-operative banks, co-operative financial institutions and the Postbank);
 - (ii) the payments environment;
 - (iii) the financial markets (including market infrastructures licensed under the Financial Markets Act, 2012 (Act No. 19 of 2012));
 - (iv) the insurance environment;
 - (v) the savings and investment environment;
 - (vi) pension fund administration;
 - (vii) outsourced administration;
 - (viii) medical schemes administration; and
 - (ix) additional services designated in terms of regulation TSB(AR) 50 (5).
- (b) The services listed in paragraph (a) may not be construed to include debt collection services.
- 4 Services necessary for the provision of social grants designated in terms of regulation TSB(AR) 1000.
- 5 Production and sale of the goods listed in category A, above;
- 6 Grocery stores and wholesale produce markets, including spaza shops and informal vegetable and fruit traders; langas operating in the Northern Cape and Western Cape; with written permission from a municipal authority to operate being required in respect of spaza shops and informal traders.
- 7 Electricity (including vital demand management services), water, gas and fuel production, supply and maintenance;
 - 8 Critical jobs for essential government services as determined by heads of National or Provincial Departments in accordance with the guidance of the Department of Public Service and Administration, including Social Grant Payments and pension payments;
 - 9 Birth and death certificates, and replacement identification documents;
 - 10 Essential municipal services;
 - 11 Care services and social relief of distress provided to older persons, mentally ill, persons with disabilities, the sick, and children;
 - 12 Funeral and cremation services, including mortuaries services and the transportation of mortal remains;
 - 13 Wildlife Management, Anti-poaching, Animal Care and Veterinary services;
 - 14 Newspaper, broadcasting and telecommunication infrastructure and services, including call centres critical for the support of such services;
 - 15 Production and sale of any chemicals, hygiene products, pharmaceuticals for the medical or retail sector;
 - 16 Cleaning, sanitation, pest control, sewerage, waste and refuse removal services;
 - 17 Services related to the essential functioning of courts, judicial officers, the Master of the High Court, Sheriffs and legal practitioners required for these services;
 - 18 Essential SARS services defined by the Commissioner of SARS;
 - 19 Police, peace officers, traffic officers, military medical personnel and soldiers, correctional services officers and traffic management services;
 - 20 Postal services and courier services related to transport of medical products;
 - 21 Private security services;
 - 22 Air-traffic Navigation, Civil Aviation Authority, air charters, Cargo Shipping and dockyard services;
 - 23 Gold, gold refinery, coal and essential mining;
 - 24 Accommodation used for persons rendering essential services, quarantine, isolation and the lockdown;
 - 25 Production, manufacturing, supply, logistics, transport, delivery, critical maintenance and repair in relation to the rendering of essential services including components and equipment;
 - 26 Transport services for persons rendering essential services and goods, and transportation of patients;
 - 27 Services rendered by the Executive members of Parliament, Members of the Provincial Legislatures, Members of Local Councils, the Judiciary, traditional leaders and National Office Bearers of Political Parties represented in Parliament;
 - 28 Commissioners of the South African Human Rights Commission, Gender Commission, and the Commission for the Promotion and Protection of the Rights of Cultural, Religious and Linguistic Communities, and the Public Protector and Deputy Public Protector, and the Independent Electoral Commission are included as essential services. Transport and logistics in respect of cargo and goods as set out in Part A to neighbouring countries;
 - 29 Towing trucks and vehicle recovery services;
 - 30 Call centres necessary to provide health, safety, social support, government and financial services, debt restructuring for consumer of retail services and access to short term insurance policies as a result of reduced income or loss of income;
 - 31 Harvesting and storage activities essential to prevent the wastage of primary agricultural goods; 32 Implementation of payroll systems to the extent that such arrangement has not been made for the lockdown, to ensure timeous payments to workers; and
 - 33 Critical maintenance services which cannot be delayed for more than 21 days and are essential to resume operations after the lockdown;
 - 34 Trade necessary for rendering emergency repair work including plumbers, electricians, locksmiths, glaziers, roof repair work and emergency automobile repairs for persons rendering essential services and for public transport vehicles permitted to operate;
 - 35 Trade necessary for emergency auto mobile repairs for persons rendering essential services;
 - 36 Information and Communication Technology Services rendered to entities and institutions engaged in delivering essential services in terms of these regulations.

TRANSPORTATION OF ESSENTIAL GOODS



The transportation of essential goods is permitted from warehousing sites to essential service providers.

Cargo may be moved from ports of entry to warehousing sites where handling and clearing of cargo is conducted. With the exception of the transportation of liquor; cargo may be transported to ports of entry for purposes of exporting.

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
